

CERTAINTY

Community Hiring Agreements lend certainty to large, complex projects by establishing the rules, procedures, and project-specific standards upfront.



TRANSPARENCY

CHAs establish clear mechanisms to ensure that projects are meeting their goals and are being managed efficiently.



ACCOUNTABILITY

CHAs hold all parties accountable for meeting agreed upon employment standards, local hiring goals, and project management practices.





GOOD FOR COMMUNITIES



KEEPS LOCAL TAX DOLLARS IN THE COMMUNITY

Community Hiring Agreements provide a boost to the local economy by creating jobs for local workers and investing in careerdevelopment.



OPPORTUNITIES FOR LOCAL **WORKERS AND BUSINESSES**

Community Hiring Agreements can expand access to family-supporting jobs and career training, increasing opportunities for neighborhood workers and businesses.



ESTABLISHES A CAREER PATH FOR LOCAL WORKERS

By tapping into apprenticeship programs with on-the-job training opportunities, these agreements equip local workers with the tools to pursue a family-supporting career.

CASE STUDY

BART Oakland Airport Connector

Under the agreement for the BART Oakland Airport Connector, the project met or exceeded all local hiring goals. Local residents worked over 70 percent of total project hours, expanding job opportunities for workers and keeping local tax dollars in the community.

Value of CHA Project: \$484 million Local Hire Goal: 50% of total hours Local Hire Outcome: 70% of total hours

DELIVERS PROJECTS ON TIME AND ON BUDGET

Community Hiring Agreements set clear expectations and standards upfront. This means construction bids are more accurate and projects are kept on schedule.




ENSURES QUALITY, REDUCING OVERALL COSTS

Community Hiring Agreements ensure that projects are managed efficiently and completed on time by enabling better workforce coordination.






GOOD FOR BUSINESS

Community Hiring Agreements use a fair, open, and competitive process for union and non-union contractors alike, ensuring that everyone is playing by the same rules.




PROVIDES EASY ACCESS TO QUALIFIED WORKERS



COMMUNITY HIRING AGREEMENTS IN ACTION



GOOD FOR COMMUNITIES

San Diego Unified School District (SDUSD): Under SDUSD's agreement, the share of local workers employed on construction projects increased. The number of workers from economically disadvantaged communities rose by 67 percent, while the share of workers from within the school district increased by 33 percent.



GOOD FOR TAXPAYERS

San Diego Central Courthouse: The Administrative Office of the Courts' agreement ensures that taxpayer dollars are well-spent. Under the agreement, there has been no negative impact on subcontractor interest or bid pricing for the project and there have been minimal corrections in the field.



GOOD FOR BUSINESS

Riverside Community College District: Ninety percent of projects under the Riverside Community College District's agreement attained or surpassed their local business participation goals, awarding over 140 contracts to local businesses between 2010 and 2014.
